** This diagram is correct to a close degree of approximation. While there was minor discrepancy across sources about a small number of books (were they included in these canons or weren't they?), the overwhelming take-aways are (1) the similarity between these early collections, and (2) the substantial agreement between their listing of authoritative books and our current NT canon.
